OSEP Child Outcomes Guiding Questions

Positive Social-Emotional Relationships

- ▶ How does the child communicate her/his feelings?
- ▶ How does the child interact with parents?
- ▶ How does the child interact with siblings?
- How does the child interact with known adults / strangers?
- ▶ How does the child interact with children?

Consider progression of social development, relationship with primary caregivers, & use of social language

Acquires and Uses New Knowledge and Skills

- ▶ How does the child learn?
- What is the child's understanding of language?
- ▶ How does the child use language to communicate what they know and understand?

Consider progression of how children learn about their environment, progression and complexity of imitation, understanding of language, & use of language to express what they know

Use of Appropriate Behaviors Meet Needs

- ▶ How does child move around to get to his/her toys?
- What does the child do to participate in her/his own care?
- How does child let caregiver know what she/he wants?

Consider progression of motor skills, self-help skills to take care of her/himself. & communication skills
