Intervention Choices

Chesterfield Infant Program versus Chesterfield County Public Schools

Families with children with disabilities often begin early intervention services when their children are very young. Children may access early intervention services from birth to age three years. Children are eligible for special education services if two years old on or before September 30 of a school year. There are circumstances when children may be age-eligible to receive services in both agencies and parents must choose which agency services best meet the needs of their child and family. Listed below are some factors that may assist families in making the right decision for their individual situation.
